She rejoins The Marshall Project after serving as a senior editor at Slate, where she led a team of writers covering the array of legal issues before the Supreme Court for the publication's Jurisprudence section. In 2020, she was the lead reporter on a first-of-its kind political survey of the incarcerated, which received an honorable mention from Investigative Reporters & Editors Philip Meyer Award for the project's pioneering use of social science research methods.


Desiree L. Fox, Ph.D., Bitterroot Salish, is an enrolled member of the Confederated Salish & Kootenai Tribes (CSKT) of Montana. She was born & raised on the Flathead Indian Reservation in Arlee, MT. Dr. Fox is a licensed psychologist in Washington & Montang & is currently the Behavioral Health Division Director & Supervisory Clinical Psychologist in her home community at CSKT Tribal Health in St. Ignatius, MT. She is also a partnering consultant for the Center for Justice Innovation's Tribal Justice Exchange in New York, NY. In this role, Dr. Fox is assisting in the development & piloting of a culturally-informed risk-needs tool for use with Native Americans involved in the criminal justice system.

Dr. Fox completed her doctoral training at the University of Montana-Missoula. Her pre-doctoral internship & post-doctoral fellowship were both completed at the Veterans Affairs Puget Sound Healthcare System-American Lake Division, in Tacoma, WA. During internship she completed rotations in Primary Care Mental Health Integration, Pain Clinic, & Telehealth. Her post-doctoral fellowship was completed within Primary Care Mental Health Integration with an emphasis on Health Psychology with minor emphases in administration & telehealth. Additionally, Dr. Fox served a co-chair of the Diversity Committee for both years of her training at the American Lake VA.

In her clinical work, Dr. Fox's intentions are to increase quality, culturally-appropriate services to the patients served in behavioral health services as well as in integrated care settings. Dr. Fox is particularly passionate about providing these services to historically- & colonially-marginalized populations. Her research interests are in Indigenous resiliency, historical loss & trauma, & holistic wellness of Indigenous peoples.

Ann M. Miller has been an attorney with the Tribal Defenders Office of the Confederated Salish & Kootenai Tribes on the Flathead Reservation in Montana for twenty-seven years & the managing attorney for seventeen. During her tenure, the Defenders Office implemented an innovative in-house service for clients with co-occurring mental illness & chemical dependency & adopted a holistic defense practice with assistance from the Center for Holistic Defense sponsored by the Bronx Defenders Office in New York. In 2015, the Defenders created the Flathead Reservation Reentry Program that provides interdisciplinary, supportive services for tribal members returning to the reservation from incarceration. The Defenders Office services have expanded to include mental health client advocates, cultural mentoring, & permanent supportive housing.

Ms. Miller served on Montana's Public Defender Commission for six years & Montana's Statewide Reentry Task Force for two years. She currently serves on the Advisory Board for the Justice Center, Council of State Governments. Ms. Miller is the 2021 recipient of the American Bar Association's Dorsey award recognizing legal services to the indigent & received the 2023 Partners for Justice legacy award for innovation & contributions to collaborative public defense.



earned her Ph.D. from the University of Montana as a member of the Indians into Psychology (INPSYCH) program. She completed her pre-doctoral internship &



John was incarcerated in Arizona for 15 years. During his time in prison, he was housed at 14 different facilities, including three private prison facilities in Indiana, Oklahoma & Arizona. Released in 2018, John continues advocating for others through his work. He holds associate & paralegal studies degrees & has over a decade of legal experience in prisoner civil rights, post-conviction relief, habeas corpus, family & civil law.



Betsy Craft (she/hers) is a state-certified C.O. Peer & Family Specialist (CPFS), community engagement consultant, & anti-carceral drug policy advocate. She is passionate about mobilizing peer-led, harm reduction services to marginalized communities & saving lives from preventable opioid overdoses.

She serves on multiple community advisory boards at the intersection of the criminal legal system, unhoused communities, & behavioral health. During the pandemic, Betsy began her career in peer support on the front line at C.O. Village Collaborative's Safe Outdoor Spaces & Tiny Home Villages listening & supporting survivors of unsheltered

In 2022, she began working with the Office of the Municipal Public Defender with the City of Denver, as a Peer Navigator, & has co-developed hundreds of overdose safety, re-entry & wellness plans for individuals inside the Denver Jails to support their successful transition back into the community. In 2023, Betsy earned a B.S. in Business & Organizational Leadership with a focus in social entrepreneurship models that build & sustain power for transfor-

Betsy uses her lived experience as an overdose survivor, survivor of homelessness. & previously incarcerated individual to 1) contribute as a drug policy advocate & advisory board member with the C.O. Drug Policy Coalition to fight for anti-carceral drug policies (2) to crowdsource, problem-solve & reduce barriers for our Denver metro housed & unhoused neighbors, & (3) to strengthen peer support workforce standards & best practices across C.O.

She is the co-chair of the Recovery Workgroup for the C.O. Consortium & leads the Advancing the Peer Support Workforce in C.O. Correctional Facilities subcommittee, a peer-led statewide movement to reduce barriers & identify opportunities to provide peer support services in carceral facilities.



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


